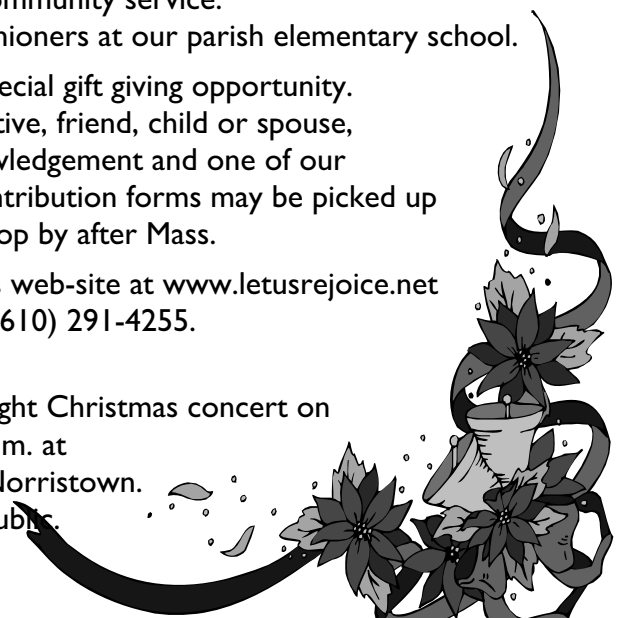
The organization also paid the school tuition for two parishioners at our parish elementary school.

Sisters of St. Joseph

Of the 901 (965 this time last year) Sisters of St. Joseph in the Congregation, at least 525 sisters are over the age of 70.

- ◆ 204 retired members reside at St. Joseph's Villa Flourtown.
- ◆ 54 retired members reside at the Motherhouse in Chestnut Hill and in our Active Senior houses.
- ◆ 267 retired members live in other local communities.

Their ministries include their dedicated response to the mission of unity and reconciliation with a special preference for the poor. They minister in 14 states, the District of Columbia, Canada and Haiti in educational, social, spiritual and health care.

As of 2011, the Sisters of Saint Joseph are present at:

- ◆ 16 colleges/universities, 26 high schools, 59 elementary schools, 3 pre-schools/child care centers and 2 programs for the developmentally disabled.

The needs within the Church have also called them to other ministries:

- ◆ 120 parishes and 14 spiritual centers.
- ◆ 39 social service sites as well as 23 health care facilities.
- ◆ 5 minister to those who are poor and immigrants at the SSJ Welcome Center located in the Kensington section of Philadelphia.

As a Congregation, they sponsor Chestnut Hill College, Mt. St. Joseph Academy, Norwood-Fontbonne Academy, St. Joseph Academy Pre-School and Cares Program, SSJ Earth Center, Bethlehem Retirement Village, Academy Village, St. Joseph Village, Cecilian Village, Saint Joseph Villa, SSJ Welcome Center, SSJ Center for Spirituality, and St. Mary by-the-Sea in Cape May, N.J.

As we begin Advent and conclude our Thanksgiving week-end, the Mission and Spiritual Care Departments at Mercy Suburban Hospital, would like to express our gratitude to you for your special presence at Mercy Suburban Hospital. You bring such an upbeat and hope-filled manner to all at the hospital. Through your generosity, the faith of our Catholic patients is nourished. We need to keep statistics so it is interesting to share that approximately 1700 patients will receive the Sacrament of the Sick during 2011. Many times we experience patients and family members returning to the Church because of the presence of the priests. It is a blessing that cannot be measured.

We are so grateful for the role of the Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist from Epiphany Parish. Mary Sheehan is a wonderful coordinator. To express our gratitude, we invited them to a "Thank you Breakfast." Seven members of your parish were able to attend. Besides breakfast, our CEO provided an update about the hospital, and there was an educational session provided by the Infection Prevention Director. This event was coordinated by Len Wohlrab, our board-certified Catholic chaplain. With your parishioners' assistance, the needs of Catholic patients are met. We estimate that 250 hours of service are provided a year with approximately 2400 patients receiving the Eucharist. In some cases, Catholics cannot receive communion, and the Eucharistic minister respond to request for prayer.

As a Catholic hospital, it is so very important for us to provide this special service to our Catholic patients. At our town hall meetings this week, I will be speaking on the difference our faith-based hospital makes in our community. At this time, we have many growth initiatives which express the confidence Mercy Health System and Catholic Health East. What makes the difference is the experience our patients and visitors have when they come to the hospital. Thank you for assisting us in the healing ministry in such a significant way. May these Advent Days be special.

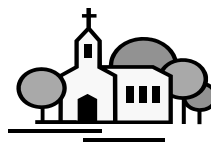

To register in the parish, arrange for a baptism, or request a Certificate of Eligibility for sponsorship at baptism or confirmation, you may contact the rectory. You may come in person to the rectory to meet with one of the deacons on any Sunday of the month (except July and August) after the 9:30 a.m. or 11:30 a.m. Masses. Also, please advise our office of any change of address, telephone number or family status.

Baptism

Baptisms are celebrated every Sunday after the 11:30 a.m. Mass, except on the fifth Sunday of the month when Baptism is celebrated during the 11:30 a.m. Mass. Both parents must attend a Pre-Jordan class, which is held the first Wednesday of every month. Pre-Registration for the class is required by coming to the Rectory office after the 9:30 a.m. or 11:30 a.m. Masses on any Sunday (except July and August) and seeing a Priest or Deacon. Sponsors are required to obtain a letter from their church stating they are members in good standing.

Marriage

Notify the Priest of your intention to marry at least six months before the date of the wedding to assure sufficient preparation and to arrange for Pre-Cana instruction and Natural Family Planning sessions. Pre-Cana Days are held in April and October.

A Note from the Principal

Our Jesse Tree is starting to fill out. A Jesse Tree is a tree on which you place pictures or symbols of famous people in the Bible who waited for the Savior. You can put anyone's picture on the tree but it is usually those people with whom you are most familiar. Some of the people and their symbols include: Adam and Eve- apple or snake, Noah-ark or dove, Abraham –stars, Moses-tablets, Mary-lily. These are just a few of the representations that are put on the tree. It is another way to celebrate Advent. The children recently had a Dress Down Day. Through their efforts we were able to donate \$80.00 to the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation. The children are collecting toiletries for St. Mary's Orphanage and selling the leftover pastries from the Craft Show. All proceeds will be donated to St. Mary's Orphanage. It's not too late to drop off toys for Operation Santa Claus. Toys can be dropped off in the back of church or in the school office.

School News

KINDERGARTEN: MRS. KONESKI: The kindergarten are anxious every morning to get to school to see where their Elf on the Shelf, Chippee, is hiding. They are so excited when they find him. This week we lit the second candle on the Advent wreath in our classroom and they colored the second candle on their individual advent wreaths. They are busy making their Happy Birthday Jesus book.

1ST GRADE: MRS. DUNSMORE: First grade is actively participating in the Advent season by marking their Advent calendars, working on the retelling of the first Christmas for their parents by performing the Nativity play titled "The First Christmas" and by concentrating on acts of kindness. For each act of kindness, the children imagine that they are placing pieces of straw in the manger to comfort the Baby Jesus for his birth.

2ND GRADE: MRS. MORASCO: The children will review single digit subtraction in math. We will continue to prepare for the Sacrament of Penance in religion. In science the children will begin to learn about States of Matter.

3RD GRADE: Ms. PALCKO: During this Season of Advent we are reading stories from the Old Testament and putting symbols on our Jesse Tree. The class started to read "Chocolate Touch" by Patrick Catling. In English we learned all about Pronouns. The 3rd graders did 2 Science Activities--"How Mining Affects the Land" and "What Happens When Materials Get Into Water."

4TH GRADE: Ms. CATANIA: The fourth grade is involved in many Advent projects. The students are writing comparison/contrast compositions with a fellow classmate. They are going to begin the first of many art history lessons.

5TH GRADE: Ms. MILLER: Fifth grade completed its unit on adjectives and their persuasive essays in Composition. They finished their study of the Central States and moved westward to the Rocky Mountain States. Sixth grade is trying to untangle the reasons behind past conflicts

in the Balkan nations while seventh grade is discovering what our new government was like after the Revolution. Eighth grade is finding out about the Populist Party's ideas for reform in the 1890s.

ART: MRS. CRAWFORD: GRADES 6,7,8: Prayer Partner letter drop

COMPUTERS: MRS. CRAWFORD: Grade Pre-K K,1, – Christmas fun on Portaportal, Grade 3 – Dance Mat typing, Grade 4 – Let's write a letter to Santa and put it on the server. Miss Havey joined us to learn Clipart, word art and how to start her letter to Santa. Grade 5&6 – Writing letters about presents they would like for Christmas, then telling which presents they would give to the less fortunate. Grade 7&8 Santa's Secret When is Santa going to drop off the letters to Epiphany? Soon!

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS: Ms. CRAWFORD: ELA GRADE 6,7,8: Plymouth Police - Assembly about bullying for 6,7 and 8th grade; Book Report Sandwiches.

GYM: MRS. GILMAN: Pre-4 through Grade 3 will work on shooting and guarding skills with the game of "Air Raid"-sliding bean bags at real bowling pins! Grades 4-8 will be tested for how many sit-ups they can do in one minute. This is a section of the President's Council on Physical Fitness Testing. They will also play Tennis Baseball. The students especially like the added challenge of scoring an automatic grand slam if they can hit the tennis ball into the far basketball net.

HONORS MATH: MRS. O'HAGAN: GRADES 4,5,6,7,8: 4th - Multiplication Patterns and the Distributive Property 5th - Subtracting Mixed Numbers using Renaming 6th - Simplifying Fractions and Changing Fractions to Decimals and Percents 7th - Special Right Triangles, Classifying Quadrilaterals, Finding Missing Measures in Polygons 8th - Graph Systems of Equations
